

RINGING IN THE NEW YEAR

But wait! Are our jolly bell-ringers engaging in a long-forbidden activity? It has recently come to light that on Jan. 9, 1869, it was resolved that the current Sexton of the Burkittsville church be fined \$10 for ringing and allowing others to ring the bell on New Year's Eve, and that the bells were never to be rung again in celebration of the New Year!



Let's hope that this piece of history is allowed to stay firmly in the past. Trude and Ray Head brought back this joyful celebration in the 1970s, but three cheers to the Sexton E. Carpenter who suffered a steep fine of \$10 (\$169.95 in our currency according to the US GPO, 1975) on a modest income so that the town could chime in 1869.



Finally, she will be teaching a silverpoint workshop on March 28th from 10-4. Silverpoint is a technique used by the old masters, prevalent during the Renaissance, in the days before pencils. Burkittsville residents have committed to keep Gapland Road clean through the Frederick County Adopt-A-Road program. You can help! Lisa Orr coordinates the effort and is recruiting volunteers to help with four 2014 weekend clean-ups:

March 29-30, June 7-8, September 13-14, November 22-23

You can help with the clean-up any time that suits you over the weekend, and you can leave bags of trash and recyclables on the roadside for pick-up. Gloves, safety vests, and bags are provided. If you want to be paired with other residents, Lisa can match you up. With four clean-ups per year, and four short segments of road between Catholic Church Road and Gathland State Park assigned to volunteers, it only requires about an hour of your time.

Burkittsville Rescue Squad!

A busload of 36 mostly elderly tourists from Ohio (one lady was 96!) were stranded at the South Mountain Heritage Society during the winter storm on December 8. Their bus had broken down, and for several hours the roads remained too slippery for another bus to make it to Burkittsville to pick them up. Tour leader Tiffany Ahalt of Middletown, who runs Star-Spangled Tours (as well as being an SMHS board member), said that our visitors remained patient and cheerful. SMHS Historian and Curator Jody Brumage returned to give them a more extensive tour than they'd received from him earlier in the day. The Main Cup, which was closing early, heard of their plight and sent goodies by 4x4, via Mr. Ahalt. Mayor Debby Burgoyne was on the spot right away to offer help from the town, Chuck Rounds arrived to offer aid after getting a Town FaceBook call for helpers, Sam and Joyce Brown and Pastor Kim Nunberg brought hot drinks. Andrea Cox coordinated telephone calls and a FaceBook request for aid. Thanks to all the people in town who jumped in to help the stranded travelers. Not only did the request for pillows and blankets send folks to their closets, but as it grew later in the day, the question of dinner arose. Chuck Rounds offered to cook a chicken dinner for all 36 people, Andrea volunteered a freezer full of chicken to make sure there was enough to go around. Meanwhile, others planned to open their homes if transport did not arrive. The bus finally came in the interval between snowstorm and ice storm to take them to shelter in Frederick. Although we did not end up making them dinner or having them as houseguests, these Ohioans left knowing at firsthand that we live in a wonderful little town.

A New Year at South Mountain Heritage Society

From all of us at South Mountain Heritage Society, we thank the community of Burkittsville for aiding in our shared mission of interpreting the history of our unique town. During 2013, some of our projects to further this mission included special exhibits on the Gapland Estate and St. Johns Episcopal Chapel. Museum volunteers have also worked to provide opportunities for tour groups from several states to visit and learn about Burkittsville. As we look forward to 2014, we are very excited to continue this mission, and to also expand some of the other components of our mission, especially an emphasis on using our historic headquarters as a center for the community.

One of our current projects, which has been ongoing for nearly a year, is the processing of our collections. What does that mean? Processing is the organization of a museum or archival collection into categories that make the objects, books, documents, photographs, and other items easily accessible for the purposes of research. Once the organizational plan is drawn up, each individual object in the collection is then cataloged. This involves entering all necessary descriptive data, such as the age, type, and content of an object into a database. Once this is finished, the object is placed in proper archival-grade storage. This means that documents, photographs, and books are placed in acid-free folders, and objects are placed in boxes. Acid-free simply means that the materials used in the paperboard help to stabilize old paper and slow the process of degradation to the artifact. Each folder and box is labeled, which is attached to the record in the database.

The end result of this project will be a much improved knowledge of our collections at the museum. Items in the collection will also be easier to access for the purposes of research. Eventually, a finding-aid, or print-out of the database, will be provided through the museum's website which will enable anyone to discover what research opportunities are available at South Mountain Heritage Society.

We also look forward to continuing our temporary-exhibits in the new year, which in the past several years have covered topics from local poets, a former Governor of Maryland from Petersville, objects from the Reformed Church Collection, and aspects of the Battle of South Mountain. Our permanent exhibits are also continuing to be improved with new artifacts and interpretative plans. We also hope to increase the technological aspect of these exhibits.

Lastly, programming for this year will not only include traditional events such as Bell and History Day and Museums by Candlelight, but also more concerts and community events. Our annual fundraisers, including the Used-Book Sale and Spook Hill Cider and Wine 4K Run, will also continue. We are very grateful to everyone who supported these events this past fall and provided one of the best fundraising months at the museum that we have seen.

Again, let us thank you for all of the support Burkittsville community members provide for South Mountain Heritage Society. Your attendance at events, financial contributions, and sharing of ideas help to expand the mission of studying and celebrating the history of Burkittsville. We are here for your use, as a place of research and learning, as a community center, and as a venue for events. 

Distillery Lane Ciderworks Recognized as First Licensed Cidery in Maryland

In a Maryland first, Distillery Lane Ciderworks has become the first and only licensed cidery in the State. The Ciderworks has already made its mark in historic avenues by being one of the few orchards to still grow apples that were favored by George Washington, as well as other older varieties. Not only do they give us a taste of history, they are preserving these varieties for generations to come. Now they have made their own permanent mark in history, taking their place as the pioneers of cidery here in Maryland.

Peter Franchot, Comptroller of Maryland, is shown below presenting a Certificate of Recognition to Distillery Lane Ciderworks owners Rob Miller and Patty Power, recognizing their distinction as Maryland's first licensed cidery in the State and their commitment to agriculture. 
In-Season (April 1 – January 1) Saturdays: 10 – 5 and
